

## Visitors

As new Brethren, we become very comfortable with what we see in our Mother Lodges. The ritual becomes second nature, the manner of managing the Business becomes ingrained, the way we greet visitors is patterned into our brains in much the same way that Dr. Pavlov trained his famous dogs.

That's unfortunate in many ways, as it often closes our minds to the enjoyment of seeing commonplace things done differently!

"Masonic Visitation" is considered in many jurisdictions around the world to be a "right", very much the same as the "human rights" guaranteed by the UN. The fact is that "visiting" is not a "right" in that sense, as any Lodge, and the Master of that Lodge, has the power to admit or refuse admittance, to any visitor except certain Grand Officers attending in the performance of their official duties. But that's not my point.

Visiting, travelling about, seeing how "the other feller does it" in many ways the lifeblood of Masonry. Our Fraternity is built on the legend of the mobile nature of stone masons and jobs, and this is immortalised in more than one place in our rituals.

I live in Nova Scotia, where I am a member of an English Lodge that sits in the middle of the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia, surrounded by 27 other Lodges within a half hours drive. More than half of them meet in the same building my Lodge uses. Two of those Lodges use a version of Emulation Work, one uses a form of Working based on an Irish ritual, and the rest use an American ritual called variously "Webb Working" or "Ancient York". The inter-visitation and cross-pollination is constant, and the Lodges experience a goodly number of Brethren who have joined additional Lodges. This can have some amusing results, particularly when sitting in Office in more than one place! In our Masonic careers, we often develop a tendency to believe many things are "done best our way", referring to the specific traditions of our Mother Lodges. This of course implies that none of the other Lodges round and about "do it right" at all!

I extend an invitation to any Brother to attend a meeting of The Royal Standard Lodge # 398 EC, meeting in Halifax on the Second Tuesday of each month except July and August, to see some of the possible "differences" for themselves. (Oh, by the way, that's Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, and no, I won't be sending the airfare.)

## YOUR STUDY CIRCLE NEEDS YOU

In a resolution of the, Ancient Society of Masons of York, dated 1725, it states & "every 1st Wednesday in the month, a Lodge shall be held at the house of a Brother according as their turn shall fall out and an hour be set apart to talk Masonry".

A great deal has changed since those early days within Masonry, and a great deal has not.

Of the things that haven't changed is the quest for knowledge and truth. Although that truth can sometimes be a vindication of one's opinion, but then one man's opinion is another man's truth, I suppose. And that is the essence of research, that seeking after truth and knowledge and well informed opinion.

Which after all, is what we are essentially all about, at not only the Southchurch Masonic Study Circle, but other bodies like Installed Masters' Lodges, and the like.

And of the things that have changed is that of a falling membership within the Craft. In the Provincial Meeting at held Great Queen Street, in March 2006, the Provincial Grand Master, the RW Bro. John Webb, made reference to the decline in membership figures. He urged that every effort be made to recruit new members and try and halt this trend.

We as a Study Circle cannot afford to rest on our laurels, and believe that this problem will not, does not affect us. It does and it will continue unabated unless we are proactive in our approach to this problem. By the balance of probabilities, we cannot escape unscathed from this phenomenon.

We have what can be best described as a 'fluid' membership base. This has over the years experienced; by its very nature, a certain amount of 'slippage'. If this trend continues with us, as it has with the Craft in general, we may very well be meeting 'at the house of a Brother' if our numbers were to fall dramatically.

A rather drastic scenario maybe, but the potential seriousness cannot be overstated. We need to, as our PGM requested, recruit new members, but also taking such measures that will retain the present membership.

Canvassing has many forms, from telling one's Lodge members of the existence of the Study Circle, and its many advantages and benefits. Advertising at Masonic Halls, either with a Poster campaign or leaflets. The Web Page, on which you are reading this, is yet another weapon in our arsenal in this campaign.

Remember the onus is on every one of us to, not only to bring to the attention of all Lodge members, but also help to apply the motto of our Study Circle, and to make certain that it continues so that it; "*diffuses light and lustre to all within its circle.*"

All of the above methods, where appropriate, will be employed to try and ensure that we grow from strength to strength. But your help as members is required in this campaign. With combined assistance there is no real reason why success should not be achieved in our cause.

And as we approach the 30th Anniversary of our Study Circle, which will be celebrated in April 2007; in an optimistic vein, it will be a milestone 'en route' to those anniversaries yet to be enjoyed.

The words of that great English poet, Alexander Pope, seem, at this juncture, to be rather apt; "*pleas'd to look forward, pleas'd to look behind, and count each birthday with a careful mind.*"

### THE AUTHOR OF THE PAPER .

Bernard Williamson is a Freelance journalist and ex director of the London Press Club. Bernard has featured on Radios 2,4, & 5, TV: BBC2- Newsnight, Channel Four news, & You and Yours, regarding both finance and Masonic matters. During 1995 and 1998 he appeared on live call talk shows on various radio stations discussing Freemasonry in the community. He had a regular bi-monthly slot on News Talk FM.

Bernard has been a Freemason since 1993 and belongs to Craft , Royal Arch ,Knights Templar, Knight of Malta and Sir Thomas of Acorn degrees and was a founder member of the Goose and Gridiron Society, an organisation open to non-masons who are researching Masonic inns and taverns.
